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Why Villanova can win the National Championship

An efficient, balanced offense

Villanova enters the tournament with one of the most efficient and balanced offenses in the country, ranked #8 in the nation. Every tournament winner in history but one has had a Top 20 offense. The Wildcats have four players who average at least 10 points per game and two others who average just over 9 points, an extremely well rounded team. They are also an elite free-throw shooting, the best FT% in history, which makes it very difficult to beat in close games as well.

A strong defense

Defense is a hallmark of a great Villanova team, and this year's squad has what it takes to win it all. The Wildcats are 28th in defensive efficiency this year, which is a tad bit lower than a typical national champion, but it's not a deal breaker. Baylor's title-winning team last year finished the season No. 22 in defensive efficiency — the first champion over the last 20 years to finish outside of the top 20 in defensive efficiency. Villanova's 2016 and 2018 national championships teams, especially the former, were both great defensive teams.

Leadership and experience

In handicapping futures this year, this is the most important metric I am looking at. In a strange year where there are 5th and even 6th year players, leadership and experience is going to be key. This year's Villanova team, like many squads in the past, brings a wealth of leadership and experience into the tournament.

That all starts and ends with the aforementioned Collin Gillespie, the fifth-year senior who returned this season after missing last year's NCAA Tournament due to a torn MCL. This season, Gillespie has been even better than last year. His team-best points and assists per game averages earned the Philadelphia native Big East Player of the Year and first-team All-Big East honors for a second consecutive season.

Gillespie and fellow fifth-year senior Jermaine Samuels are the two last remaining pieces from Villanova's 2018 national championship team. Meanwhile, most of the Wildcats' key contributors from last year's Sweet 16 team are back again. This group has played in plenty of high-level non-conference, Big East and postseason tournament games. The Wildcats won't be intimidated by any matchups in March.

Coaching

Whenever someone thinks of the best basketball coach in NCAA history, they automatically think of Coach K, but I would argue Jay Wright is right there with him. When it comes to leadership and experience in March, there isn't another coach I'd rather have.

In 21 seasons as the Wildcats' head coach, Wright has led the school to 16 NCAA tournament appearances. The Hall of Famer's tournament resumé consists of seven Sweet 16s, four Elite Eights, three Final Fours and two national championships.

Wright has seen it all and he knows as well as anyone how important it is to zone out the surrounding distractions when you have multiple days or only 24 hours to prepare for an opponent and get your team ready. The only coach in this year's tournament with more rings than Wright is Duke's Mike Krzyzewski, who will obviously be retiring at the end of the season, and I can see the two legends facing off in the Final.



Why Duke can win the National Championship

Short answer is I don't think they can, but they can get pretty darn close. The end of Mike Krzyzewski's coaching career is on the horizon. At most, the legendary Duke basketball coach has six games remaining. There is tremendous pressure around this and the Blue Devils have not played their best during Coach K's biggest farewell tour moments. They lost to UNC in his final game at Cameron and were upset in the ACC Tournament final against upstart Virginia Tech. That said, this team has a ton of star power, and I really like their path to get to the Final Four. I am not as high on Gonzaga as most, I think there is a very real chance they lose to Memphis in the second round, or Arkansas in the Sweet 16. If they do make it to the Elite 8, Duke has already beat them once and is more than capable of doing it again. While I don't think Duke wins, in a perfect world we'd have a 17/1 Duke ticket and a 25/1 Nova ticket and just be able to sit back and enjoy the championship game and have a very handsome profit either way.
